What is that smell?

Some say it smells like rotten eggs or sulfur. It is actually mercaptan, an odorant added to natural gas as a safety precaution. Recognizing this smell can alert you to a natural gas leak.

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WHAT TO DO

- If inside, **get out immediately**.
- If outside, safely abandon any motorized equipment you might be using and **leave the area immediately**.
- From a safe location, away from the area, call **911** and **NIPSCO** at **1-800-634-3524**.
- **Wait for our service crew and emergency responders to arrive**. We work closely with emergency responders to prevent and respond to incidents.

WHAT NOT TO DO

- Don't light a match or candle, or operate anything that could cause a spark, including cell phones, lights, appliances, flashlights, power tools, etc.
- Don't open the windows and doors in an attempt to ventilate the building.
- Don't try to find the leak yourself, repair a leak or operate pipeline valves.

Natural gas is considered one of the safest and most reliable ways to power homes and businesses. It will not burn on its own, but when mixed with the correct amount of air and exposed to an ignition source, it can ignite.
